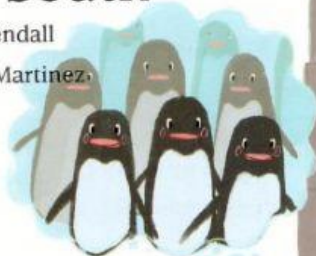

 That they were soon on the shore—.



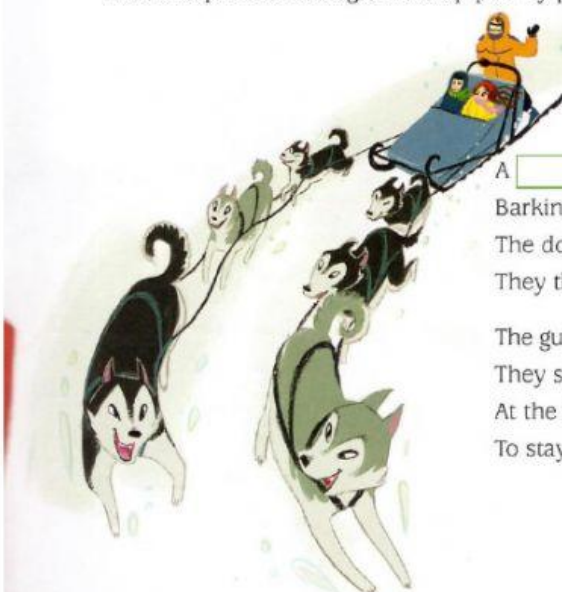
Step In
