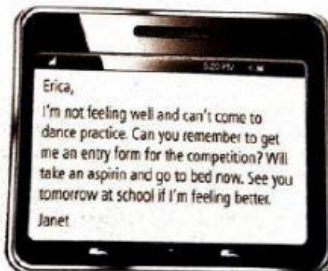

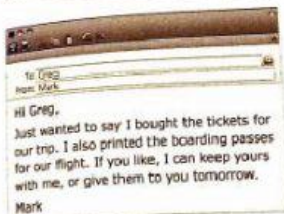

Online Gaming

A new type of game has hit our computers in recent years, one which combines two of the most popular teenage interests: computer games and online chat. Online games allow players to get involved in the world of the game; complete missions, fight battles and score points, and at the same time chat to other players. What is special about this is that the characters in the games are controlled by real people; people who are playing the same games from their own bedrooms in countries all over the world!

This means that when you play these games, you are actually interacting with people just like you, and not the programmed systems of traditional computer games. Players interact with each other as much or as little as they want. Some teenagers limit their social 'chat' to game purposes, whether that's teaming up with another character to fight a common enemy or passing the football across the pitch in order to set up a goal for their team. Others, however, are now playing this sort of game for social reasons.



'It's fun talking to people from other countries,' says Luke, 16, from London. 'Knowing that you both love the game means that you already have something in common. Of course, you should stick to games that are suitable for your age group. I'm also very careful about who I chat to and I never give personal information to strangers.' Jenny, 18, from Scotland says, 'Some of my best friends are people that I've met in online games. We log on and talk about everything from school to hobbies, and if we don't feel like talking, well, we just play!' Thousands of teenagers all over the world are now enjoying this 'social gaming' as they join the online community of players.

Does it ever get boring? I doubt it! There is a huge range of interactive games available for all ages, including role playing games (RPGs) where you play as a character, board games like chess or backgammon, and even sports games. Of course, you need a good connection to the Web and a computer that supports games, but apart from that you're ready to go. You don't even need to count your pocket money because there are hundreds of free games online.

Online gaming is changing the way we think about computer games. They are no longer a reason for teenagers to be locked in their rooms and not socialising – quite the opposite! These kinds of games give young people the opportunity to engage with others, to socialise and to meet people that otherwise they might never have had the chance to meet. I suppose we shouldn't be too surprised as this is just another one of the many ways that the Internet is being used for social reasons. Despite its attractions, though, it should never replace getting out and spending time with your school friends.

Living with Tourette's

Fifteen-year-old Michelle talks about a medical condition that affects about one child in every hundred.

When I tell people I've got Tourette's Syndrome, most people think that I'm going to start swearing at them or saying horrible things. That's how Tourette's is always shown in films and on TV, but actually only about ten per cent of Tourette's sufferers have no control over the bad language they use. Luckily, I'm not in that group.

Tourette's Syndrome is a condition that starts and develops in childhood. The main symptoms are tics. These are either small sharp facial or body movements, or sounds. The problem is that a Tourette's sufferer has no control over them and, while they might only be small movements like jerking your head, it can be pretty embarrassing, believe me! The worst thing is not knowing when this is going to happen, and if I go out with people that I don't really know, I get quite self-conscious.

No one really knows what causes Tourette's and, at the moment, there isn't a cure for it. It's not so bad though, because the tics don't stop me doing anything I want to do, and actually I don't even take medication for them. Lots of people who have Tourette's only have mild cases, and surprisingly, most sufferers are actually school children. They suffer from tics like coughing, sniffing, blinking their eyes a lot and strange facial movements. It usually gets worse when children are between ten and twelve years old in their last years of primary school, just when they are starting to worry about what other people think of them.

Luckily, only about fifty per cent of children who suffer with Tourette's continue to have it when they grow up. The tics usually stop by the time teenagers are eighteen, which means that many adults who had the condition as children are fine now. That's quite a comforting thought and, even though I'm used to my condition, I hope I'm one of the lucky ones who doesn't have to deal with it when I'm older.
