

Types of Sentences

There are four types of sentences in the English language:

- Declarative: this sentence makes a statement. Use a period (.) to punctuate a declarative sentence.
Example: Dogs require daily walks.
- Interrogative: this sentence asks a question. Use a question mark (?) to punctuate an interrogative sentence.
Example: Did you know that dogs require daily walks?
- Imperative: this sentence gives a command (an order). Use either a period (.) or an exclamation mark (!) to punctuate an imperative sentence. The difference is one of tone (if you are expressing emotion, like anger, use an exclamation mark).
Examples: Walk the dog. Go walk the dog already!
- Exclamatory: this sentence expresses strong emotion, like pain, anger, joy. Use an exclamation mark (!) to punctuate an exclamatory sentence.
Example: I got a dog yesterday!
