

Independent and Subordinate Clauses

A clause is a group of words that contains a subject and a predicate.

Reminder: the predicate is the action in the sentence (the verb) and the subject is the thing or person doing the action (noun or pronoun).

Clauses come in two forms: independent and subordinate.

An independent clause can stand alone as a sentence because it expresses a complete thought.

Example:

She read the book that her father had bought her.

This clause has a subject (**she**) and it has a predicate (**read the book**). It can be its own sentence. Therefore, it is an independent clause.

A subordinate clause has a subject and a predicate, but it cannot stand alone as its own sentence.

Example:

that her father had bought her

This clause has a subject (**that her father**) and it has a predicate (**had bought her**). However, it does not make sense alone. It needs to be linked to an independent clause to make a sentence.
