

Prepositions

A preposition is a word that shows the relationship of one word to another word in the sentence.

Examples: **prepositions** show a relationship of a **word** to *another word in the sentence*
Put the *milk* **in** the **fridge** before it spoils.

There is a *monster* **under** the **bed**.

Anthony walked **to** **school**.

Here are some commonly used prepositions:

about	against	at	between	from	of	through	under
above	among	behind	by	in	on	to	upon
across	around	beside	for	into	over	toward	with

Prepositions are used to show **direction**, **time**, **location**, and **space**.

Examples:

Direction: Look **to** the right and you'll see a flying squirrel.

Time: I'll see you **at** noon.

Location: Run! He's **behind** you!

Space: I found your book **under** the desk.

Unfortunately, there is no magic rule to know which preposition to use in which circumstance. The best solution is to read as much as possible. It will come naturally to you with time.
