In the final scene of *Pirates of the Caribbean: The Curse of the Black Pearl*, Jack Sparrow (Johnny Depp) calls his pirates back onto the ship while, to the left of the screen is a man in a white t-shirt and sunglasses. Looking out to sea. This is only one of several mistakes in the film where crew or equipment are visible: there are many others which are factual. For example, Port Royal in Jamaica is built on a beach however, in the film set it's built on top of immensely tall cliffs.

Maybe the problem is that we're too busy concentrating on the action to pick up on details. For example, in *Raiders of the Lost Ark*, when Indiana Jones is confronted by a cobra in the Well of Souls, did you see the reflection of the snake in the safety glass between it and Harrison Ford? Incidentally, the director of this film, Steven Spielberg, tops of the list of directors likely to make mistakes, with a record of 1148! You begin to wonder if some of them are deliberate – put there to see how willing we are to believe everything we see in the escapist world of the movies. This might explain some of the more obvious goofs in *Die Another Day*, like the one where James Bond's car turns back over during a chase on the ice, and part of the left mirror breaks off. When the car turns back over, the mirror is intact. We also see the heroine, Jinx, being cut across her stomach in the final fight scene. Yet, moments later, her stomach is OK.

But this is not the only sea adventure where things are wrong. *Titanic* is said to contain more than 180 mistakes, a number of which are anachronisms. Given that the *Titanic* sank in 1912, Rose, the heroine, would not have been able to admire Monet's painting 'The Nymphs', which he painted in 1915. And it's impossible for Jack, the hero, to have gone ice fishing on Lake Wissota, as he claims, since this wasn't discovered until 1918. But perhaps only historians would notice these mistakes. The majority of us are more likely to notice continuity mistakes like the one involving First Office William Murdoch: immediately after he has shot himself, in the next scene he is seen trying to untie one of the lifeboats.

Of course, we wouldn't want our heroine's beauty to be ruined, would we? This unwritten rule must be the cause of a lot of obvious mistakes. A good example is in the 2005 remake of *King Kong*. The scenes in New York take place in winter, on a day cold enough for the lake in Central Park to freeze and hold King Kong's weight. Yet the heroine shows no hint of cold, even though she's wearing a light summer dress. Kong takes her to the top of the Empire State Building, where it's even colder. Not only does she show no discomfort, but she also climbs a metal ladder, holding on with her bare hands.

But are all directors 'imperfect'? What about revolutionary director Alfred Hitchcock, who was known for being obsessed with detail? Seldom did he start shooting a film that wasn't already planned in his head, so surely his films are error free? Well – no. Take his horror film, *Psycho*: when the heroine, Marion, is leaving town after stealing from her boss, she keeps checking the speedometer of her car, and you can clearly see that the indicator is not moving. And even *Citizen Kane*, regarded by many film fans as one of the best films ever made because of its innovative filmmaking techniques, contains twelve mistakes. One of these is in an outdoor picnic scene: director Orson Welles did not have enough money to film outdoors, so he had to shoot the scene in the studio, using scenes from other films. The scene he used was from *King Kong*, and four pre historic birds can clearly be seen flying by. The studio told Welles to take the birds out of the shot, but he liked them and decided to keep them. How many other errors were left in the film, then, even though the Director was aware of them?

So, when is a mistake not really a mistake? Next time you watch *Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone*, look out for the start of term feast. Harry sits down on the right side of the table, next to Ron. When the food appears, Harry is on the other side of the table, next to Hermione. A mistake, or just Harry showing off his magic powers? I'll leave you to decide: after all, in the world of movies, everything is magical.
