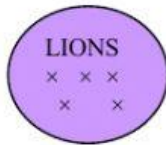

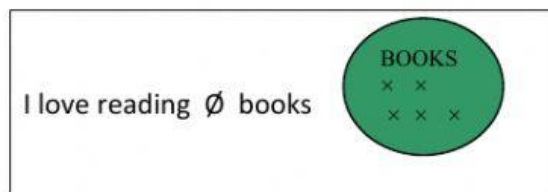

I. Pour des généralités :

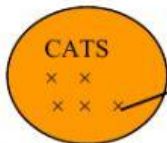
1) *Généralités :*



Ø Lions are faster than Ø cats.

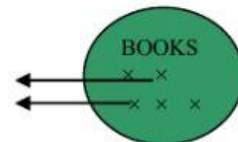


2) *Cas particuliers :*
