## 4 important components of CONCLUSION



**SCENARIO:** Hot-headed John discovered that he had hastily accused his classmate of stealing his wallet.

CONCLUSION	Solution	<b>John apologised profusely to his classmate Peter.</b>
	Emotional adjective	<b>John felt ashamed.</b>
	Show feelings	<b>His face turned a scarlet bright red and his eyes was cast downwards for the rest of the lesson.</b>
	Lesson learnt  (gives up character trait)  (Use an action verb )	<b>He vowed never to be hot-headed again. From that day onwards, John never jumped to conclusions.</b>
	Proverb	<b>He learnt never to judge a book by its cover.</b>

**SCENARIO:** Marty was caught cheating on his math test.

<b>CONCLUSION</b>	Solution	<b>Marty was sent to the Principal's office and was suspended from school.</b>
	Emotional adjective	<b>Marty felt ashamed.</b>
	Show feelings	<b>His face turned a bright beet red and he wanted to sink into oblivion.</b>
	Lesson learnt  (gives up character trait)  (Use an action verb )	
	Proverb	



**SCENARIO:** After months of practice, Marty became first in the running competition.

<b>CONCLUSION</b>	Solution	<b>The teacher congratulated Marty and gave him a medal.</b>
	Emotional adjective	<b>Marty felt over the moon</b>
	Show feelings	<b>A huge grin spread across his face as he received the shiny gold medal. He puffed out his chest and pumped his fist in the air.</b>
	Lesson learnt  (gives up character trait)  (Use an action verb )	
	Proverb	




**SCENARIO:** Playing with matches had gone out of hand and now the entire house is on fire.
