

Comma Rule #2 - Commas between Coordinate Adjectives

Use a comma to separate two or more coordinate adjectives preceding a noun. Coordinate adjectives can be written in any order.

Hint: In your mind, you can replace the comma with the word "and," and if that trick works and sounds correct, you have CORRECTLY used the comma between the two coordinate adjectives.

Directions: Add commas where required.

Example: I like cold fizzy drinks. *Answer:* I like cold, fizzy drinks.

1. Arthur's men, both Wetstick and Backlack, are loyal trustworthy men.
2. The soldiers of the king looking for Arthur prove themselves to be corrupt untrustworthy villains.
3. Arthur's frightening violent nightmares are about the death of his brave loving parents.
4. In fact, Arthur blocks the truth of his dreams until he fights large dangerous creatures in the Bad Lands.
5. The mage's magic seems to control feral menacing creatures of nature.
6. Vortigern's threatening oppressive rule pushes his people into poverty and despair.
7. The eagle acts as the mage's quiet powerful helper.
8. After the small band of rebels take Arthur to their wooded populated hideout, he joins them.

9. Arthur must take responsibility for his weakened oppressed people if he wants to save them.

10. Arthur's call to adventure forces him to travel a perilous deadly road of many trials and challenges.
