

My Trip to Vancouver

A series of exercises covering what we've done so far

Vancouver is a coastal seaport city in Canada, located in the province of British Columbia.

As the most populous city in the province, the 2016 census recorded 631,486 people in the city. The Greater Vancouver area (Metropolitan Vancouver) had 2,463,431, making it the third largest metropolitan area in Canada. Vancouver is the most expensive city in Canada!

Vancouver is one of the most diverse cities in Canada; 52% of its residents have a first language other than English. Vancouver is the hub for newcomers to Canada, especially those from Asia. There are very large Chinese populations in Metropolitan Vancouver, so much so that many signs have English, French, and Chinese writing!

Port Metro Vancouver is the busiest and largest port in Canada, and the most diversified port in North America. While forestry remains its largest industry, Vancouver is well known as a city surrounded by nature, making tourism its second-largest industry. Major film production studios in Vancouver and Burnaby have turned Greater Vancouver and nearby areas into one of the largest film production centres in North America, earning it the film industry nickname, Hollywood North.

Some popular places to visit in Vancouver include Stanley Park, Granville Island, Gastown, and Canada Place. Outside of the city, you can visit Capilano Suspension Bridge, Grouse Mountain, and many other natural beauties!
