Rosa Park's Bus Ride

On December 1st, 1955, an African American woman named Rosa Parks was riding the bus home from work. A white man was standing up on the crowded bus. The driver demanded that Parks give up her seat. At the time, the law in many places in the South said that African Americans had to give up their seats to white people. Rosa Parks refused to give up her seat. She was tired of giving in to laws that were unfair.

Parks was arrested and found guilty of disorderly conduct. Four days later, the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., organized a bus **boycott**. African Americans did not patronize city buses for over a year. Finally, the court ruled that African Americans no longer had to give up their seats to white people.
