

Conjunctions, Prepositions, Pronouns and Adverbs

Conjunctions bring two sentences together:

I went to bed **because** I was tired.

Prepositions tell us where or when something is happening:

I waited **by** the school gates.

Pronouns are used instead of people's names or titles:

She wanted to run the fastest.

Adverbs tell us more about the verb:

Jo spoke **slowly** so the man could understand.

Find the **conjunction** in each of these sentences:

I wanted to go to the park **but** it was raining.

She usually eats at home **because** she likes cooking.

Sarah chose popcorn **and** ice-cream as her snacks.

The bus arrived at 9am **so** I was late for school.

I waited until my mum arrived at school.

The cinema is **next to** the supermarket.

I found my school bag **under** the sofa.

My mum and dad were married **in** 2014.

The aeroplane was flying **over** the sea.

I ran **around** the playground six times!

Find the **pronoun** in each of these sentences:

Her mother is a doctor.

The shoes are mine.

His parents are always late.

Mr Piper is my new maths teacher.

Why are they walking so fast?

Find the **adverb** in each of these sentences:

I normally go to bed at 8pm.

The children were talking loudly in the class.

She crossed the road cautiously.

She drove her car fast.

The exam was really difficult.
