

MUST , MUSTN'T , NEEDN'T

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MUST implies OBLIGATION: *He must be quiet at the hospital.*

MUSTN'T implies PROHIBITION: *He mustn't talk loud at the hospital.*

NEEDN'T means NOT NECESSARY: *He needn't see the doctor because it's not serious.*
