Time sequencers

On our first date, we went to the movies. **After that**, we started meeting every day. On Thursday I had an argument with my boss. **The next day** I decided to look for a new job. We sat down to eat. **Two minutes later** the phone rang. **When** I came out of the club, he was waiting for me. The accident happened **when** I was crossing the street.

- We use time sequencers to say when or in what order things happen.
- We use **when** as a time sequencer and also to join two actions.
I was watching TV when the phone rang. (two verbs joined by when)
- **Then, after that**
The most common way of linking consecutive actions is with then or after that, but NOT only with after:
I got up and got dressed. **Then/ After that** I made a cup of coffee.
NOT **After I made a cup of coffee.**

Connectors

Because and so

She was driving fast **because** she was in a hurry. (reason)
She was in a hurry, **so** she was driving fast. (result)

- Use **because** to express the reason why something happens.
- Use **so** to express result.

But and although

She tried to stop the car, **but** she hit the man.
Although she tried to stop the car, she hit the man.
She was very tired, **but** she couldn't sleep.
She couldn't sleep, **although** she was very tired.

- Use **but** and **although** to show contrast.
- **Although** can go at the beginning or in the middle of a sentence.
