ERRORS TO LOOK FOR

Section 3. Prepositions

One of the most common errors in test passages is the use of prepositions. Remember that they are always used with other words. They express some kind of relationship. For example,

- appearing after certain words to give the required meaning: e.g. **look for** = search.
- starting prepositional phrases: e.g. **in** the beginning; **after** the lesson.
- indicating time, place and direction: e.g. **at** six o'clock, **in** the field, **towards** me.

There are many other uses of prepositions, such as after adjectives (e.g. afraid **of**, pleased **with**). They can precede nouns and verbs.

Prepositions also help to give English its rhythm, which needs your attention because the rhythm of any language is unique and so different from any other language that you may be used to.

Study the usage in this passage, where the prepositions have been highlighted for you. At each usage, check why this preposition is used. Repeat your reading until you are sure you understand.

For many millennia, the common belief was that the game **of** Go was invented **by** the Emperor Yao **around** 2250 BC. Modern historians find this account implausible **for** several reasons; a more likely explanation is that the game was developed as a tool **for** prediction **by** astrologers of the Chou dynasty **around** 1000 BC. They are known **to** have cast black and white counters **onto** a board marked **with** symbols. It is certain that the game was an established part **of** Chinese culture 2,000 years ago. Go was probably taken **to** Japan **about** 1,500 years ago, becoming popular **during** the Heian period (794–1185). The modern game began to emerge in Japan **with** the subsequent rise **of** the warrior (samurai) class.

TEST 21

Carefully read the text below, consisting of 12 lines, about the tragic result of an accident on the PIE.

A large tailback of traffic occurred on the Pan-Island Expressway (PIE) today. This happened after an accident close the lanes leading to Changi Airport. In the accident, the man was killed when the lorry he was travelling in was involved in an accident with a car. Four other vehicle were involved in the pile-up and 12 other people – including the female driver of the car – was injured and taken by Singapore Civil Defence Force (SCDF) ambulances to Changi General Hospital (CGH). After a call for assistance was received at about 7.24am, four ambulances and one fire-bike were dispatched to the scene. A large police presence was also needed to deal with the traffic hold-up that occurred at a busy time of the morning with workers and passengers all involved in the hold-ups. The authorities believed that no one actually missed any flights as a result of the incident on this unusual occasion. This new material contains limestone-producing bacteria, which is activated by corrosive rainwater working its way into the structure, whereby using water to its advantage. This could potentially extend the service life of any concrete used, with considerable cost savings as a result. The work is taken place at Delft Technical University. It is the brainchild of microbiologist Henk Jonkers and concrete technologist Eric Schlangen, who have both made contributions to a research on this material over many years. Dr Jonkers hopes to start commercialising the system within the next three years.
