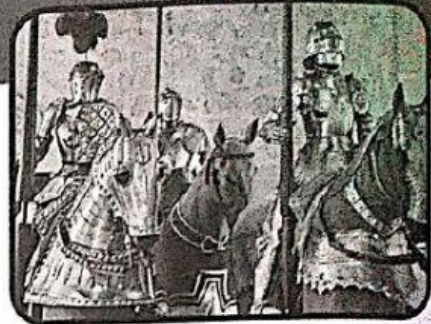

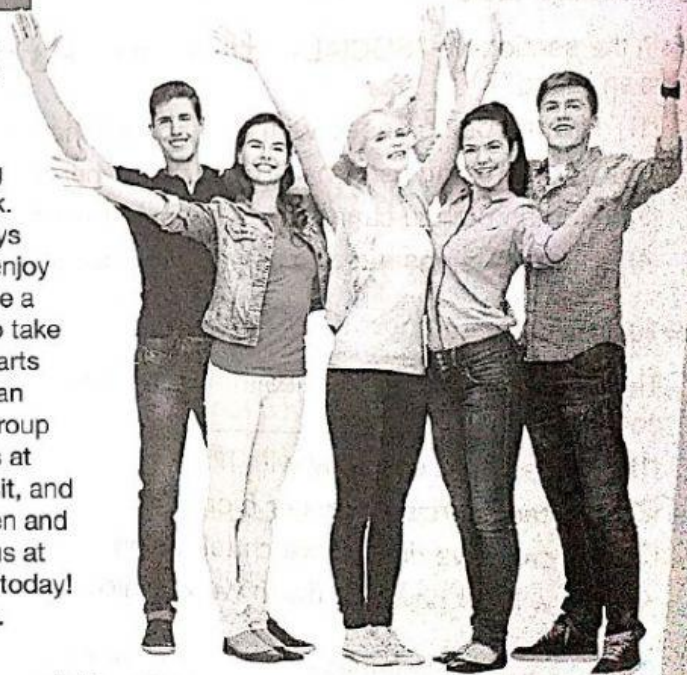

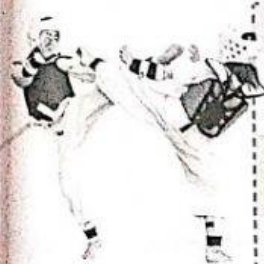


Here are some highlights of the choices available at KCC. Do read through what we have to offer before coming for our MAPY tour. You will benefit a lot if you come prepared with questions.

All our instructors are from the famous Taek It Away Academy.

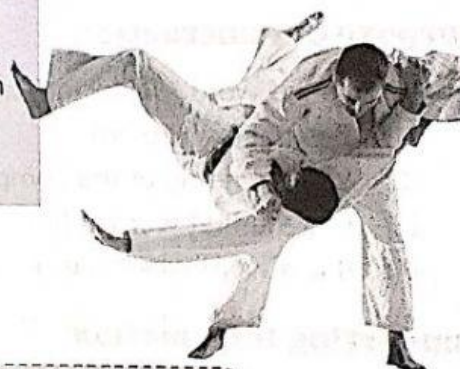

Beaming Bhutan — VS — Greenhouse Gases

In a faraway place lies a country that is small but "shining". While the rest of the world is waging war against greenhouse gases, this tiny kingdom tucked between the two huge nations of China and India can claim to have won this war. It is possibly the only country in the world that has a negative carbon footprint. Read on to find out what this means ...

Carbon Has a Footprint

When we walk along a stretch of sandy beach, we will leave a trail of footprints behind us. Did you know that each of us also leaves behind a carbon footprint? This is a measure of the amount of greenhouse gases (mostly carbon dioxide) that is emitted because of the activities that we engage in. For example, when we have a family barbecue, the charcoal that we burn emits carbon dioxide

(CO₂). When cars are driven or aeroplanes are flown, CO₂ gets emitted too. How about playing with a toy such as a plastic doll? Well, CO₂ is emitted by the factory which produces the doll.



Tell Me Why?

What is wrong with the emission of CO₂? Firstly, CO₂ causes excessive heat to be trapped in our atmosphere, which leads to global warming. Other than making the world a much warmer place, it can lead to other problems such as the melting of glaciers and the starting of forest fires. For man, the danger comes from diseases associated with the nose, throat and lungs, which are often caused by increased levels of CO₂.

Success Story

Each of us leaves behind a carbon footprint from the things we do. Countries also have a carbon footprint, which can be measured by the amount of CO_2 they emit. You may ask, is it possible to reverse this trend? Can we absorb CO_2 instead of emitting it?



The answer is yes!

When a country absorbs as much CO_2 as it releases, we say that it has a neutral carbon footprint. A country can even have a negative carbon footprint. This means that it absorbs more CO_2 than it releases. Bhutan is the only country that has achieved this! Let's see how they have done this.

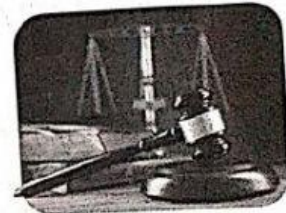


► Planting More Trees

You might have learnt in your Science textbook that trees take in CO_2 and release oxygen. That is absolutely right and it is the best weapon in this war against greenhouse gases. Bhutan is extremely active in planting trees. For example, in March 2016, they planted 108 000 trees to celebrate the birth of a new prince!

► Protecting Forests through Law

Bhutan is so serious about maintaining the amount of forestry in the country that they have written laws about this. One of its laws states that the country has to maintain at least 60 percent of its total land area as forests. According to a Climate Council website, about 80 percent of its land is covered by forests.



► Encouraging Natural Sources of Energy

One of the main producers of CO_2 is factories, especially those that generate electricity. Bhutan tries to reduce this by not relying on such factories. For example, they use the powerful Himalayan rivers in their country to generate electricity. In fact, they have produced so much electricity that they can even sell it to other countries!

Bhutan is certainly beaming in victory in this war against global warming. Indeed, many lessons can be learnt by looking at how they run their country. Perhaps their success comes from their attitude towards life. Their 4th ruler (King Jigme Singye Wangchuck) once declared in 1972 that the most important measure of a country's success is not economic progress but "Gross National Happiness", which is the level of happiness of the country's citizens.
