'Her face went terribly white, and she said, “I did not go to meet anybody.”

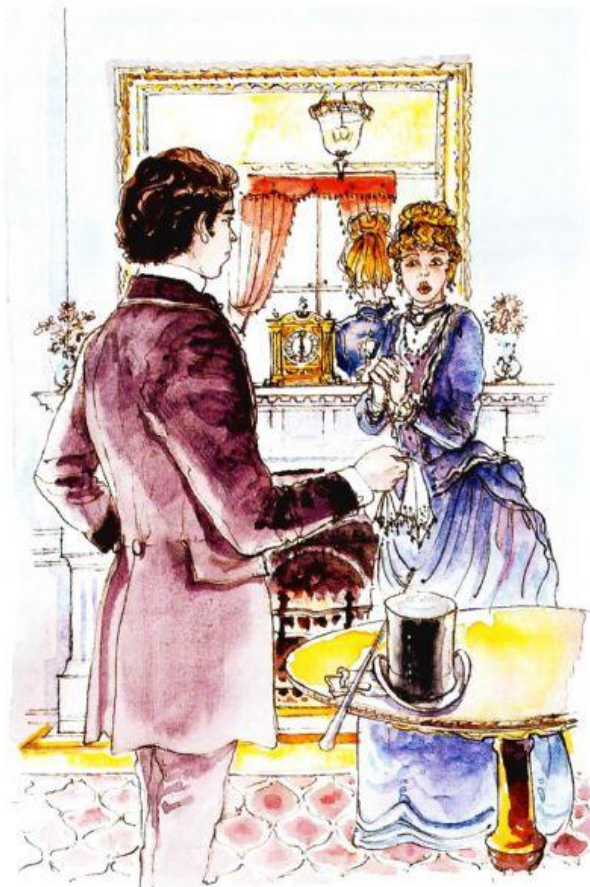
'“That's not true,” I said.
