In 1832 and 1838, as part of Andrew Jackson's Native Indian removal policy (Indian Removal Act of 1830), the Cherokee nation was forced to give up its land east of the Mississippi River and to migrate to an area in present-day Oklahoma. The series of relocations, where the migrants endured hunger, disease and exhaustion, was called the "Trail of Tears." This devastating journey cost the lives of about 4,000 Cherokees.

The Cherokee Indians became the fifth major tribe to experience forced relocation to the Indian territory, following the Choctaw, Chickasaw, Creek and Seminole tribes. The Cherokee nation moved from its ancestral homeland in parts of North Carolina, Tennessee, Georgia and Alabama to land set aside for them in what is now known as the state of Oklahoma.
