Use quantifiers to talk about different amounts and quantities.

Larger quantities

Use *a lot of*, *lots of*, *loads of* and *plenty of* with uncountable and plural nouns.

*There are **a lot of** cars on the road today.*

*I've got **plenty of** time. (= more than enough time)*

Note that *plenty* is always used with a positive meaning.

Use *too much* with uncountable nouns and *too many* with countable nouns to say there is more than we want:

*There's **too much** traffic today.*

*There are **too many** cars.*

Smaller quantities

Use *several*, *one or two*, *a couple*, *a few* and *not many* with plural nouns. (*Several* refers to a larger quantity than *one or two*, etc.)

*I've only got **a little** fuel left, so we need to stop soon.*

*There are only **one or two** cars ahead.*

Use *a little* and *not much* with uncountable nouns.

*I've only got **a little** fuel left.*

*I haven't got **much** fuel left.*

Some

Use *some* to talk about neutral, non-specific quantities with uncountable and plural nouns:

*I need **some** more fuel. There are **some** service stations ahead.*

Zero quantity

Use *not any* with plural and uncountable nouns to talk about zero quantity:

*There **aren't any** other cars today.*

*I **don't have any** fuel.*

Questions about quantity

Use *much* or *many* to ask about quantities:

*Were there **many** cars on the road today?*

*Was there **much** traffic?*

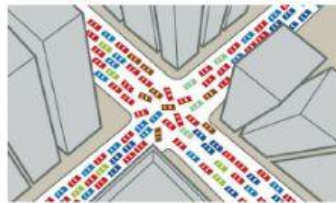
