

Preposiciones temporales funcionales

Las siguientes preposiciones temporales tienen un uso más funcional: muestran cómo se relacionan dos o más acontecimientos en el tiempo. Por ejemplo, "Lisa jogs before dinner" significa que Lisa corre primero y cena después.

Preposition	Use	Examples
before	antes de	Before work, Tony eats breakfast.
from... to	hora de inicio... hora final	Tony works from 9 AM to 5 PM.
from... until/till	hora inicial... hora final	Tony works from 9 AM until 5 PM.
for	cantidad de tiempo	Tony works for eight hours.
during	dentro de un tiempo	During the day, Tony eats a small snack and lunch.
by	antes de un momento	By 5 PM, Tony is quite hungry again.
after	después de	After work, Tony goes home and eats dinner.
in	dentro de una cantidad de tiempo	Tony eats four times in twelve hours.

to vs. until vs. till

Tanto "to" como "until" expresan ideas similares, pero hay una diferencia de uso entre ambas palabras. *To* es una preposición y debe ir seguida de un sustantivo, normalmente la hora de un reloj, como 3:45 PM.

Until es tanto una preposición como un adverbio, lo que significa que es más flexible. Hasta puede ir seguida de cualquier sustantivo de tiempo o incluso de una cláusula entera. Si te confundes, puedes utilizar *until* y siempre será correcto. [*Till* es una versión corta y menos formal de *until*. *Till* (también escrito como *'til*) es más común en el inglés hablado].

Ejemplos:

- Jane stayed from 3:30 **to** 5:30. / Jane stayed from 3:30 **until** 5:30.
- Jane stayed **until** the end. / Jane stayed **till** the end.
- Jane stayed **until** every person in the room had left. / Jane stayed **till** every person in the room had left.
