



Do you pay attention to music in films? Do you have favorite scores?

The Juilliard School (/ˈdʒuːliɑːrd/ JOOL-ee-ard) is a private performing



arts conservatory in New York City.

Established in 1905 as the Institute of Musical Art, the school became the Juilliard School of Music in 1946 and was subsequently renamed the Juilliard School with music, dance, and drama programs. It is widely regarded as one of the most elite performing arts schools in the world.

Benny had scored several Hitchcock films already. Hitch knew talent and Benny had it. ‘I have the final say or I don’t do the music,’ Benny said. ‘Hitchcock is very sensitive. He leaves me alone.’

During the murder the sound of the shower should be continuous and monotonous, only broken by the screams of Marion.” Well, as you know, the scene didn’t work out that way. That was not silent.

And between his collaborations with Orson Welles and Martin Scorsese, was perhaps his most famous partnership of all – the one with Alfred Hitchcock.
