*Liar, Liar! Pants On Fire!*

Growing up, almost all of us can remember a group of giggly kids chanting together, "Liar, liar, pants on fire!" Back then, this taunting by the neighbourhood kids was all said in fun and games. More than often, however, lies aren't so funny when they become a destructive force in the matter of everyday human relations.

Scientists at the University of California have shown that people lie on average 200 times a day. That's about once every 8 minutes! Wouldn't it be useful if you could tell when someone is lying to you? Well, experts spend years studying people's gestures, speech patterns and behaviour.

One of the most common and reliable signs that someone may be lying is pauses which can be either too long or too frequent. This is a stalling technique used to buy time to create a story or excuse. You can also tell if a person is lying by his eye contact. Usually, someone will begin the lie by looking away and then make eye contact later on in the lie or he may avoid eye contact altogether. Finally, when someone is lying, he may become more aware of his body language and work to cover it up to the point of eliminating it.

Most of us believe, wrongly, that we are easily able to spot liars. However, this might not be the case. So the next time you think someone is lying to you, look carefully for these tell-tale signs.
