

Uses of Adverbs: So & Neither



We use So + auxiliary + pronoun to agree with positive statements.	A: I really love travelling B: Great! So do I.
We use Neither + auxiliary+ pronoun to agree with negative statements.	A: I don't go out much. B: What a coincidence! Neither do I.
We use a positive auxiliary to disagree with a negative sentence.	A: I don't like cycling. B: Oh, I do.
We use a negative auxiliary to disagree with an affirmative sentence.	A: I'm a vegetarian. B: Oh, I'm not.
