

Tips and examples:	
<b>Such</b> might be followed by an adjective + noun	It was such a lovely evening
<b>Such</b> might be followed by a noun in exclamations It might also be followed by a noun when it means 'this type'	He's such a player! I've never heard such music before
<b>Such</b> might be followed by a lot of / lots of	I had never seen such a lot of people together
No such + noun means 'this does not exist'	Aliens! There's no such thing!
Such as means 'for example'	Cities such as London are becoming more and more powerful

I don't often drink so much coffee (4 words)  
= I don't often drink \_\_\_\_\_ coffee.

I've never done anything like this before (3 words)  
= I've never \_\_\_\_\_ before
