



Different Types of Sentences

Statement	A statement is a sentence that tells the reader something. It usually ends with a full stop.
Question	A question is a sentence that asks something. It ends with a question mark.
Command	A command is a sentence that gives an instruction or an order to do something. If the command is urgent or is said in an angry way, then it ends with an exclamation mark.
Exclamation	An exclamation is a sentence that expresses a strong feeling (such as surprise or shock). It begins with 'How' or 'What' and ends with an exclamation mark.
