

MUST / MIGHT / COULD / MAY / CAN'T + INFINITIVE

I am waiting for Julie with another friend, David.

I ask: 'Where is Julie?'

David guesses:

- She **must** be on the bus. (I'm fairly sure this is a good guess)
- She **might** come soon. (maybe)
- She **could** be lost. (maybe)
- She **may** be in the wrong room. (maybe)
- She **can't** be at home. (I'm fairly sure this isn't true)

Notice that the opposite of '**must**' is '**can't**' in this case.
