Grammar: Present perfect with Yet Already Just

Present Perfect with Yet, Already, Just

The present perfect is the verb **have** + past participle.

Yet and Already

Yet is used to talk about things you expect to happen. **Already** describes things that have happened, often sooner than expected. Use **yet** for questions and the negative, and use **already** in the affirmative.

A: Have you been to the new mall **yet**?

B: No, I haven't been there **yet**. / Yes, I've **already** been there.

Just

Just means "a short time ago."

Vicky has **just** left. She left her desk five minutes ago.

Note: **Already** and **just** usually come between **have** and the past participle.

Ask and answer. Use **yet**, **just**, or **already**.

For example: they / finish / meal

Q: Have they eaten their meal yet?

A: Yes, they've just finished.
