

Main uses of the gerund and the infinitive with "to"

The Gerund (doing)

A. After certain verbs like **enjoy, hate, finish, mind, avoid, suggest, can't help, spend/waste (time), fancy, keep...**:

Did you enjoy reading that book?

I hate washing up.

B. When the subject of a sentence is a verb:

Meeting new people is exciting.

Being able to speak other languages will help you find a job.

C. After prepositions:

Are you afraid of flying?

I'm worried about not finding a job soon

D. With certain phrases and expressions:

I look forward to hearing from you.

It's a very good film. It's worth watching it.

There's no point in talking to her. She won't listen to you.

The Infinitive (to do)

A. After certain verbs like **would like, plan, try, offer, decide, forget, expect, hope, want, begin, choose, learn...**:

I'm planning to have a party on my birthday.

They decided to get married.

B. After many adjectives:

She's happy to live in Germany.

John is afraid to lose the football match.

It's important to be punctual.

Note: Some verbs can be followed by both gerund and infinitive, generally with the same meaning:

I like hiking / to hike

I love swimming / to swim

I prefer going out / to go out at the weekend
