THE CHRISTMAS AROUND THE WORLD

Read the text and complete the activities on page two.

TEXT A: Children in Italy have their Christmas gifts delivered by a witch! But don't worry — La Befana is a kindly witch dressed in a long black coat who flies from house to house on a broomstick. At night on 5 January, Befana slides down the chimneys to fill the stockings of well-behaved children with gifts. Naughty kids just get a lump of coal!



TEXT B: Christmas starts early in Germany — kids leave a boot or shoe outside the door on 5 December to be filled with candies!

TEXT C: Rather than put a roast turkey on the table, families always go to a local Kentucky Fried Chicken . The tradition began in 1974 after a successful marketing campaign called "Kurisumasu ni wa kentakkii!" or "Kentucky for Christmas!" in Japanese.



TEXT D: Sunshine and 35°C? That doesn't sound like Christmas to us! But while it's winter here in the Northern Hemisphere (the northern half of the Earth) in December, in the Southern Hemisphere (south of the Equator) it's summer time.
