“Festival of Lights,” Hanukkah

Hanukkah is a Jewish festival. It usually happens in November or December. The word 'Hanukkah' means 'dedication' in Hebrew. The festival remembers when the Jewish people won a big fight against the Greeks about 2,000 years ago. The Jews lived in Israel at that time but the Greeks took over their land. They wanted the Jews to be like the Greeks and not follow their own religion. But the Jews didn't want this. They didn't want to follow Greek customs. They wanted to follow their own culture and religion. So, Jews started a fight against the Greeks. In the end, the Jews defeated the Greeks and took control of their land. When the Jews went back to their temple (a special building where they prayed), they saw that it was very dirty because of the fighting. They cleaned it and then they wanted to light a special lamp called the menorah. But there was only enough oil for one day, and it needed eight days to make new oil. But a miracle happened: the oil lasted for eight days instead of one! This is why Hanukkah lasts for eight days. On the first day of Hanukkah, Jewish families light one candle on the menorah. On the second day, they light two candles. Every day they light another candle until there are eight candles. They also give presents to each other, and children play a game with a spinning top called a dreidel. The dreidel has four Hebrew letters on it: nun, gimel, hey, shin. These letters stand for the sentence 'Nes gadol haya sham', which means 'A great miracle happened there'.

People win chocolate coins or nuts if they get a certain letter. Jewish people also eat special food during Hanukkah. They eat food cooked in oil, like potato pancakes called latkes, and doughnuts filled with jam. The oil in the food reminds them of the oil in the menorah. During Hanukkah, Jewish people remember how the Jews got back their temple and their land, and that miracles can happen.
