

# Film Music - Key Words

## Music Spotting

The Film Music composer attends a 'music-spotting' session with the Director and decides where music is to feature in the finished film.



## Mickey-Mousing


**MICKEY-MOUSING** is used especially in animated films, cartoons and comedy films and is where the music mimics every small movement. *e.g. sliding trombones as characters journey up and down in a lift, a descending chromatic scale as a character goes down a set of stairs.* Timing is crucial when using MickThe Film Music composer attends a 'music-spotting' session with the Director and decides where music is to feature in the finished film. Mickey-Mousing and Film Music composers often use **CLICK TRACKS** to help them time their music exactly.

## Click Tracks

An electronic METRONOME which helps film composers accurately time their music to on-screen action through a series of 'clicks' (often heard through headphones) – used extensively in cartoons and animated films.

## Storyboards

A graphic organiser in the form of illustrations and images displayed in sequence to help the composer plan their soundtrack.



## Cue Sheets

Cue Sheets are then produced containing accurate timings (in seconds and fractions of seconds) of all dialogue and descriptions of the action.

# Diegetic and Non-Diegetic Film Music

DIEGETIC FILM MUSIC – Music within the film for both the characters and audience to hear e.g. a car radio, a band in a nightclub or sound effects.

NON-DIEGETIC FILM MUSIC – Music which is put “over the top” of the action of a film for the audience’s benefit and which the characters within a film can’t hear – also known as **UNDERSCORE** or **INCIDENTAL MUSIC**.
