

Future Perfect

We use the **future perfect tense** to talk about an action that will have been finished at some point in the future. This tense is formed with **will have + the past participle of the verb**.

Examples:



- By next year, they will have built the tower.
- When I am 25, I will have finished university already.
- You will have written five sentences by Monday.

Future Progressive

We use the **future progressive tense** to talk about something that will be happening at some point in the future. To form the **future progressive tense**, we use will be and the **-ing** form of the verb.

Examples



- I **will be celebrating** my birthday all day.
- They **will be traveling** to Europe next year.
- He **will be hiking** on Tuesday.
