Bob wanted to share his love for painting, and in 1982 he launched "The Joy of Painting" on PBS. The show ran for 11 years, during which recorded more than 400 episodes (triple the amount of TMOOP). The Joy of Painting became, and remains today, one of the most popular shows on public television.
