A Hunderfossen Winter Park – Norway



We went here on our half-term holiday, and it was by far the best thing I've ever done! B Riverside Ride, Rotterdam to Vienna

I did this ride with student friends from university. It sounds like a cycling marathon for sporty types, but that wasn't us!
