Modal verbs are never used \_\_\_\_\_. The main verb is used in the \_\_\_\_\_ (without to). Example: You **must follow** the rules.

Modal verbs always have no \_\_\_\_\_ in the third person singular and no participles (-ing/-ed). Example: You/He **may apply** to participate in one of the Erasmus programmes.

The \_\_\_\_\_ and \_\_\_\_\_ forms are made without the auxiliary to do.

Example: **Can** I **study** abroad? – I **can't apply** this year.
