A White water rafting

White water rafting is an arduous sport which involves travelling on inflatable boats along rivers or areas of fast flowing water. For the activity to be classified as white water rafting, the water encountered has to be white water, which indicates rough and rapid conditions. Rivers are usually categorised according to their degree of difficulty, from Class I beginner to Class VI expert. Although the higher class rivers are more challenging, even dangerous, enjoyment can be had in all categories. This activity is often enjoyed by groups of friends, and no experience is required, as each centre provides a qualified instructor who is in charge of directing the group, telling them when to paddle and ensuring their safety through the water. Whilst on the raft, everybody is expected to work together as a team and use paddles to get through the vigorous water – this is when the hard work comes into it! Inside the boat there are foot straps in the bottom of the raft to help to keep the balance. As a security measure, life jackets and, in many cases, helmets are to be worn at all times. Participants will need to provide swimming suits and a towel. This sport suits those that are looking for an immediate thrill, who are confident swimmers and those that are not afraid of getting very wet!

B Bungee jumping

This activity involves being attached at the feet to an elastic cord. The cord is connected to a high structure, sometimes fixed like a bridge, building or crane, or sometimes moving like a hot-air balloon. When the person feels ready, they jump from the structure towards the ground. The thrill comes from the free-falling sensation produced whilst falling through the air. As the elastic cord oscillates up and down it produces additional excitement for the participant, and this feeling eventually stops once the energy has dissipated. The secondary oscillations add to the participant's excitement. This activity can be performed alone or with a partner, in which case, you are both tied at the feet together and both jump at the same time. No preparation is needed whatsoever from the person taking part and the company used will provide the cord and of course the building! Although it looks dangerous, the most common injury is actually damage to the eye from the pressure in the eye when the jumper recoils upward. If you have high blood pressure or a heart condition you should advise the bungee crew though it won't necessarily prevent you from jumping. If you are pregnant, you cannot jump. This sport is not advisable for anyone who suffers from vertigo.

C Snowboarding

Snowboarding entails riding a snowboard down the slopes of a snowy mountain. When first learning this sport, people acquire bruises on different parts of their body, as they often fall over due to the nature of the sport. To snowboard, people need appropriate warm and waterproof clothing, a snowboard, board boots and in the interest of safety, a helmet. Most of the equipment can be hired from shops or ski centres. Although this sport does not require very expensive equipment, people need to factor in the cost of a lift pass and possibly an instructor when first starting out. Lift passes are required to transport people to the slopes. This sport can be enjoyed by anyone of any age and, generally speaking, people do this sport in a group, but of course, there are people that snowboard alone. This sport can be as perilous or as safe as the individual wants. Speed can, but needn't, be a factor.

D Skydiving

Skydiving is a sport where a person jumps out of a moving craft, usually a small plane or helicopter, at an average height of 4000m. It takes thousands of jumps and a lot of time and money to master this exhilarating sport. Although the fall is from an immense height, sky divers do not experience the same free-fall sensation as with other extreme sports. This hobby is both fun and costly and can be pursued alone or with a group. Before the jump, you will need to inform the company of your precise height and weight and confirm that you do not suffer from any health problems. To jump solo you will have to be qualified, which means you have done a complete course but if you don't want to do a course you can do the jump attached to an instructor, who operates the parachute and ensures safety at all times. The sport's high cost is due to the equipment needed: a pilot, a plane, an instructor and of course a parachute. This activity is ideal for those that have always dreamt about flying.

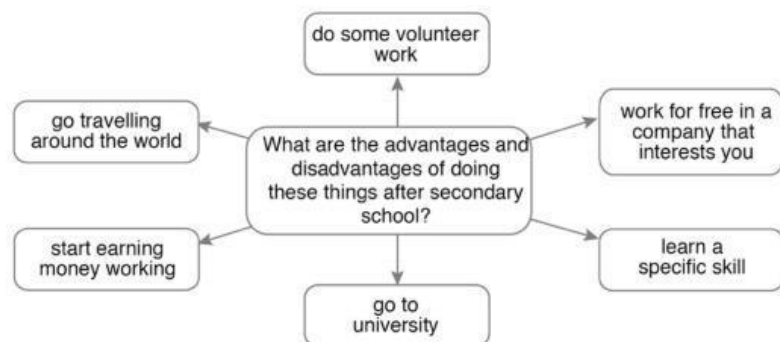
