

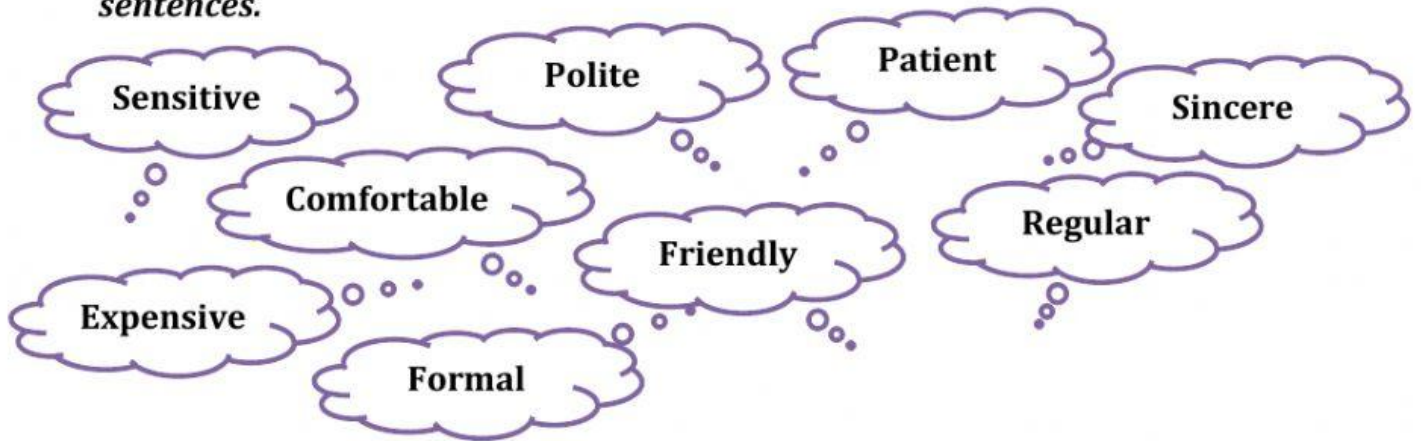
In English, one way to make *negative adjective* is by adding negative *prefixes* to the adjective. Here are some English negative prefixes: *il-*, *im-*, *in-*, *ir-*, *un-*.

PREFIXES	EXAMPLES	
-il	Words that take il- as a negative prefix always begin with the letter l .	Legal – il legal Literate – il literate Logical – il logical
-im	Words that take im- as a negative prefix always begin with the letter m or p .	Moral – im moral Perfect – im perfect Possible – im possible
-in	Words that take in- as a negative prefix can begin with a vowel (except i or u) or a consonant .	Accurate – in accurate Organic – in organic Sane – in sane
-ir	Words that take ir- as a negative prefix always begin with the letter r .	Rational – ir rational Regular – ir regular Responsible – ir responsible
-un	Words that take un- as a negative prefix may begin with a vowel or consonant .	Able – un able Interesting – un interesting Helpful – un helpful
