Sonnet 73 William Shakespear

That time of year thou mayst in me
behold
When yellow leaves, or none, or few,
do hang
Upon those boughs which shake
against the cold,
Bare ruined choirs, where late the
sweet birds sang.
In me thou see'st the twilight of such
day
As after sunset fadeth in the west,
Which by and by black night doth take
away,
Death's second self, that seals up all in
rest.
In me thou see'st the glowing of such
fire,
That on the ashes of his youth doth lie,
As the death-bed's light shows but a
little higher
Before his race they run, and flickering
die.
Yet loved I am of many, though such as
you
Some time ago loved me, and have
grown cold in love.
