MANY + PLURAL COUNTABLE NOUNS

- How many days are there in January?
- How many people work in your company?
- How many cousins do you have?
- How many books did you buy?
- How many countries are there in the world?
- How many chairs are there in this room?
- How many pieces of chocolate would you like?

2. PRICE (ЦЕНА)

3. OMITTING THE NOUN

OFTEN THE NOUN IS OMITTED IN THE QUESTION WHEN IT IS OBVIOUS WHAT WE ARE TALKING ABOUT.

ЧАСТО СУЩЕСТВИТЕЛЬНОЕ ОПУСКАЕТСЯ В ВОПРОСЕ, КОГДА ОЧЕВИДНО, О ЧЕМ МЫ ГОВОРИМ.

A: I would like to buy some cheese.

B: How much (cheese) would you like?

THE NOUN CHEESE IS NOT NECESSARY AFTER HOW MUCH SINCE WE ALREADY KNOW WE ARE TALKING ABOUT CHEESE.

МЫ УЖЕ ЗНАЕМ, ЧТО РЕЧЬ ИДЕТ О СЫРЕ, ПОЭТОМУ МЫ НЕ ИСПОЛЬЗУЕМ ЕЩЕ РАЗ ЭТО СЛОВО ПОСЛЕ HOW MUCH.

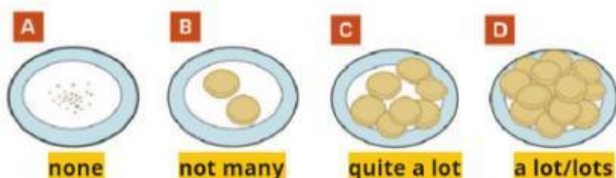
