She's taking a nap **on** / **in** the sofa.

He's waiting **at** / **in** the entrance.

You are not allowed to use your cell phone **inside** / **in** here.

The Pyrenees are **on** / **in** the border of Spain and France.

I'd love to live **in** / **on** the Isle of Wight.
