If Easter Island had been discovered on a different day, it could have been named anything from Christmas Island to Birthday Island. Dutch explorer Jacob Roggeveen was really not that creative when it came to naming things. Upon discovering a remote island on Easter Sunday, Roggeveen decided Easter Island was a good enough name.

Since Roggeveen discovered the island in 1722, the world has marveled at the massive stone statues that circle the island's perimeter. Called moai, these incredible statues are shaped like human figures – though with heads proportionately much larger than the average man's. The tallest moai stands at over 33 feet tall.
