

The imperative form is a way to give clear instructions or simple orders. Your teacher gives you classroom commands using the imperative form to tell you and your classmates what to do.

Imperatives use the base form of the verb. Imperatives are formed without a subject because the subject is the person the speaker is talking to, e.g. 'You'.

Example:
