As a kid, I loved watching wildlife programmes, and I always knew I wanted to work with animals one day. Because I lived in New York, I'd never seen a live alligator. I'd been to the zoo, of course, but I'd always spent all my time with the cute animals, like the monkeys. Then, when I was 15, my dad got a job in Florida and we went to live there. That's when I saw my first wild alligators, and I fell in love with them.

I'm now an alligator catcher. There are lots of wild alligators in Florida and our job is to find and catch ones that are causing problems for people, usually because they end up in places like swimming pools. My parents weren't very happy with my job at first, but they accept it now. I also help care for alligators at a local rescue park, and show them to visitors. I don't get any money for this, but I don't mind because it's fun!

I remember the first alligator I caught. It was in a stream close to some houses. The water was quite deep, so it took us hours to get it out. We tried to encourage it to climb out on its own, but, in the end, I had to climb down and grab it from behind, then get my hands around its mouth, while my colleague tied it shut. I thought I'd be scared, but in fact I felt relaxed. Once we'd tied its mouth it was easy to keep it still and lift it out.

The alligators in the rescue park are great. Some were caught in the wild, but others were born in the park, so they're more used to humans and they don't mind us touching them. Of course, you have to remember that they are still dangerous animals, so you can never relax completely or know what they are thinking. But I don't worry about being injured – if it happens, it happens. The park gets visitors from all over the world and I love showing them what beautiful and amazing creatures alligators are!
