



MORE & A LOT OF

- More: Used when comparing quantities, meaning a greater amount of something.

-> Example: I need more water. (Comparing the current amount with a needed amount)

- A Lot Of: Used to indicate a large quantity, without comparison.

-> Example: I have a lot of books. (Indicating a large number of books)
