

Figure of Speech



A figure of speech is a literary use of a word or words diverging from its usual meaning for the purpose of clarity, emphasis or freshness of expression.

Read about the common figures of speech given below :

Simile : A statement that directly compares two unlike things.

Metaphor : A statement of unreal comparison.

Apostrophe : A statement in the form of an address with an exclamation.

Alliteration : A statement with repetition of the initial letter or sound.

Irony : A statement that expresses something opposite and humorous.

Oxymoron : A statement with mutually opposite comparison.

Hyperbole : A statement that emphasizes unreasonable things.

Paradox : A statement that appears to contradict itself.

Personification : A statement in which a non-human object or aspect is represented as a person.

Metonymy : A statement in which one word or phrase is substituted with which it is closely associated.
