In the phrase "*highly emotional people*," the word *"highly"* functions as an adverb of degree. It modifies the adjective *"emotional"* by intensifying or specifying the extent to which the people are emotional. Adverbs of degree are used to indicate the level or intensity of an action, adjective, or another adverb.
