

FOR, SINCE, FROM

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FOR vs SINCE

FOR + PERIOD OF TIME

for two weeks, for ten years, for ten days, for a few hours, etc.

- ➔ We've been here **for** a few hours.
- ➔ When I met them, they had been married **for** ten years.

SINCE + STARTING POINT

since I was born, since ten o'clock, since Wednesday, etc.

- ➔ We've been here **since** four o'clock.
- ➔ They had been married **since** 2010.

SINCE vs FROM

SINCE WITH PRESENT AND PAST PERFECT

- ➔ I have known John **since** I was a child.
- ➔ I was exhausted. I had been at work **since** six a.m.

FROM IN OTHER CASES

- ➔ Masks will be compulsory **from** tomorrow.
- ➔ I'm usually here **from** six o'clock.

CPR training is mandatory **from/since** the beginning of the medical school curriculum.

Since/from the implementation of new techniques, CPR success rates have improved.

You should start chest compressions **from/for** the moment the patient collapses.
