Modal verbs: ability and possibility; obligation and prohibition		
Modal verb	Expressing	Example
Must	Strong obligation	You must stop when traffic lights turn red.
	Logical conclusion/ certainty	He must be very tired. He's been working all day long.
Must not	Prohibition	You must not smoke in the hospital.
Can	Ability	I can sing.
	Permission	Can I borrow your pen, please?
	Possibility	Smoking can cause cancer.
Could	Ability in the past	When I was a kid I could run very fast.
	Polite permission	Excuse me, could I say something?
	Possibility	It could snow tomorrow!
May	Permission	May I use your phone, please?
	Possibility, probability	It may be a better day tomorrow.

Might	Possibility, probability	I might go on holiday to Vienna.
Have to	Need / 50% obligation	You have to study for your test.
Should/ ought to	50% obligation	I should/ought to see a doctor. My headache is terrible.
	Advice	You should/ought to pay attention. The test is tomorrow.
	Logical conclusion	He should/ ought to be very tired. He's been exercising all day.
Had better	Advice	You'd better revise your lessons.
