LEARNING TO LEARN: PRONUNCIATION

Listening to help your pronunciation

It can be difficult to pronounce some similar sounds clearly. The first stage is to check that you can actually notice the differences when you listen to similar sounds. This is more difficult when you listen to natural, continuous speech. Make time for focused listening and notice which sounds you find difficult to identify.
