How do verbs change in reported speech? Use the text and the conversation in direct speech to help complete the table.

Direct speech	Verb tense	Reported speech (Mia told me...)	Verb tense
"I am going to a concert on Friday."		...she was going to a concert on Friday.	
"My favorite band will be performing."		...her favorite band would be performing.	
"I am really excited about it."		...she was really excited about it.	
"I've already bought the tickets."		...she had already bought the tickets.	
"I'm counting down the days."		...she was counting down the days.	
"I'll be too busy."		...she'd be too busy.

Note: If a direct quote is in the past simple tense, it usually stays that way in reported speech. Alternatively, it can be transformed to the past perfect tense.

Example: "I stayed up all night last night."

- She said she **stayed** up all night last night.
- She said she **had stayed** up all night last night.
